"WHO WE ARE and WHAT WE DO"

The Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation is a corporation without share capital, incorporated by Letters Patent in the Province of Ontario on February 13, 1974. While it is a separate legal entity and has no direct relationship to the Regional Municipality of Waterloo, it is funded by an annual per capita grant from Regional Council and its affairs are administered by Regional staff.

The Foundation is an umbrella-funding organization for heritage-oriented groups throughout the Regional Municipality of Waterloo and as such, has contributed to many projects over the years. It's major project in the early years was the restoration of the Award-winning Joseph Schneider Haus, later transferred to the Regional Municipality of Waterloo. More recently it has funded in whole or in part, acquisition of archival materials, books about famous Canadians who made Waterloo County their home, the microfilming of fragile area newspapers and The Waterloo County Bibliography, to mention a few.

The Foundation actively supported the establishment of Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committees (LACAC's) in the four (4) Townships and provided "seed" money to help them get started. It has also contributed funding for projects of other heritage organizations and reports from some of these groups are included in this Annual Report to provide a brief outline of the kinds of activities in which citizens of the Region are involved.

The Board of Directors is composed of members appointed by several local heritage groups, members-at-large elected annually from among citizen applicants and appointed Regional Council representatives.

In addition to regular monthly meetings and the Foundation's Annual Meeting, workshops and other special events such as the annual HERITAGE SHOWCASE are undertaken. Reports about some of these events are also included in the Annual Report.

The Foundation's logo was designed by Ronald E. Kropf of Wellesley, a local artist, who was at the time on the staff of the Region's Planning and Culture Department.

The TREE represents the Regional Municipality of Waterloo in its role as the provider of "umbrella funding" to the area historical societies and heritage oriented groups. The tree is indicative of the Black Walnut trees throughout the Region, rooted in the heritage of the community. The tree is also indicative of protection of our heritage.

The LEAVES of the tree represent the seven Area Municipalities which comprise the Regional Municipality of Waterloo.

The STONE HOUSE in the circle is representative of the style of architecture common to the Region and recognizes the stone buildings found in both the southern and northern parts of the Region.

In endeavouring to learn the history of the logo, the assistance of William E. Thomson and Susan Duke, as well as Ronald E. Kropf is gratefully acknowledged.

This year the Heritage Foundation celebrated its 20th Anniversary, as did the Regional Municipality of Waterloo (formerly the County of Waterloo).

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WATERLOO HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Waterloo Historical Society had another active year in 1993. Three public meetings were arranged for the enjoyment of members and the general public. In March, Nancy Pollock-Ellwand, from the University of Guelph, spoke about the preparation of a cultural heritage landscape inventory in Ontario. The May meeting was held at the J. Steckle Heritage Homestead, Kitchener, and included entertainment by Ian Bell, musician in residence at the Joseph Schneider Haus. In November the annual meeting was held at the Seagram Museum, Waterloo, with archivist Sandra Lowman as speaker.

The highlight of the year for the WHS was the presentation of the Scadding Award of Excellence from the Ontario Historical Society. The OHS recognized the Waterloo Historical Society's impressive publication record of producing an annual volume every year since 1913. These volumes have provided valuable research for teachers, students, historians and genealogists for 80 years. The Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation supports this publication with an annual grant.

Excellent progress was made in the research for the Waterloo Township history being prepared by Dr. Elizabeth Bloomfield. A special evening of "Remembering Waterloo Township" was held at Doon Heritage Crossroads in June. A panel discussion was organized and memories were solicited from members of the audience. The evening was videotaped for future reference.

The WHS computer which was purchased through the efforts of a fund raising campaign in 1992 was installed in the Grace Schmidt Room, Kitchener Public Library. Dr. Elizabeth Bloomfield added an automated version of the Waterloo Regional Bibliography, which has been a valuable research tool in the GSR.

Other WHS activities included another successful bus tour exploring the Speed and Eramosa Rivers. A "birdseye view" map of Berlin in the mid 1890's was professionally restored for the archives. Towards the end of the year the WHS received a grant from the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation towards the cost of microfilming the New Hamburg Independent newspaper.

Once again, 1993 was a busy year for the members of the Waterloo Historical Society. The WHS will continue to play an active role in the preservation of the history of Waterloo Region.

WATERLOO - WELLINGTON BRANCH

ONTARIO GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

The publication of Waterloo-Wellington Branch member Ryan Taylor's series on genealogy which appears in the Saturday editions of The Record has generally increased the level of interest in genealogy in the Region. Since publication attendance at meetings of the Branch has increased Speakers during the past year have presented significantly. topics such as: Children who were brought to Canada through the auspices of various organizations between 1835 and 1939; United Empire Loyalists; Illness and Death in Victorian Ontario; Ontario Resources for previous origins, and Archival holdings at the Perth County Archives. In addition, a tour of the Waterloo Historical Society collection, held at Kitchener Public Library, was undertaken, as well as a tour of Wilfrid Laurier University Library. A meeting sponsored jointly by the LDS Church and the W-W Branch presented Paul Smart, from Utah, who is a great expert on British genealogy. Regular meetings are held at 7:00 p.m. on the second Monday of each month at Kitchener Public Library.

Work on transcribing all cemetery tombstones in Waterloo Region has been completed. The Branch is now re-checking a few of the very early transcriptions of the old cemeteries to correct any errors which may have occurred. Cemetery transcriptions are available for sale from the Branch or available for viewing at public libraries. The Branch is also cooperating with a group in Victoria, B.C., who are presently constructing an index of every tombstone in Ontario. When completed, this finding aid will be invaluable when searching for missing ancestors or families who relocated.

The branch now has over 300 publication titles which are available for sale. In terms of revenue earned, publication sales, which are predominantly mail order sales to all corners of the world, far exceed revenue raised from memberships. New publications this year are: Waterloo Wills: Maiden Name Index to Waterloo Wills: Index to the 19th Century of Waterloo Registry Office Records by David McKnight; Waterloo County Churches Before 1900: A Research Guide, by Rosemary Willard Ambrose, and an index to names and articles appearing in Branch Notes 1972-1974, the quarterly publication of W-W Branch. The latter has been undertaken by the "Autumn Gleaners", a group of Senior Citizens who are active in the Branch. This group is

also presently working on an index to obituaries which have appeared in *The Record*, as well as producing a separate index to pedigree charts in the local collection, an index which will eventually contain thousands of names.

An important part of Branch activities is participation at functions both in and out of Waterloo Region. A few of the events of '93, '94, are: Waterloo Regional Heritage Day Showcase; "Norfolklore" Fair at Simcoe County; the Clifford Historical Fair; Wellington County Museum Genealogical Workshop, and regional workshops in Oakville and Stratford. In June '94 the annual seminar of the Ontario Society will be held in North Bay and local members will attend.

Funding was received from the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation to assist in publication of Waterloo County Churches Before 1900: A Research Guide, by Rosemary Willard Ambrose. The Genealogical Society is most grateful for this assistance.

In April Heritage Cambridge hosted the ACO Conference and AGM. All meetings were held in the restored Galt City Hall. Members volunteered their homes for bed and breakfast guests. The weather cooperated beautifully for the tour of Cruikston Park's grounds and tea at Langdon Hall.

Throughout the summer, we will again sponsor walking tours in historic Galt. In the fall, in cooperation with the Galt Horticultural Society, we will refurbish the interior of our joint quarters at 37 Grand Avenue.

We plan to lead off our fall season with a successful house tour; follow up with exciting programs; and enjoy a productive year of preservation.

REGIONAL OFFICIAL POLICIES PLAN REVIEW

HERITAGE SECTION

This review has been completed save for one final wrap-up meeting. There was a workshop May 1st 1993, and the open house presentations were scheduled for general comments. Our last comments are to be received by June 15th 1994.

There has been some overlap in review between the recently appointed Heritage Advisory Committee and the ROPP heritage review because of overlapping members. At the last meeting the chairman volunteered to submit comments for the Foundation and any assistance would be appreciated.

ARCHIVES COMMITTEE

The Archives Feasibility Study, prepared by Dr. Elizabeth Bloomfield, was released to various interested participants in Responses to the study were encouraged, but the Region. The Archives Committee unfortunately, few were received. recommended that no public statement be made as it was felt that the small number of responses did not provide enough support for The Committee also suggested that a a particular model. Standing Committee be formed which would be linked to the Grand River Chapter of the Archives Association of Ontario. Several Foundation members are also members of the archives group, and will provide a communication link between the two organizations. Future projects suggested were: an inventory of pre-1973 municipal records, a network of finding aids held in various archives, and a compatible computer software package.

GRAND RIVER WATERSHED

The publication of The Grand Strategy for Managing the Grand River as a Canadian Heritage River and its acceptance by the Government of Ontario and the Canadian Heritage Rivers Board marks the culmination of a long and arduous process. The Grand has been designated as a Heritage River primarily based on its cultural and recreational features. It is the first river in a highly settled part of Canada to receive this mark of distinction. Although this is a very important milestone, it marks the beginning of an even more important phase in which government agencies, community groups, educational institutions, businesses, individuals, and foundations such as ours will work together to promote and reinforce the concept of the Heritage River designation.

The Foundation has supported the designation of the Grand as a Heritage River throughout the process. In June, 1993, one of a series of community workshops was attended on behalf of the Foundation. We also provided a detailed response to a questionnaire that focused on the issues and priorities in the watershed. More recently, comments regarding the first draft of The Grand Strategy were provided to the Grand River Conservation Authority. The Foundation has formally endorsed the Heritage River nomination, adding its voice to a registry of support for this initiative.

The Grand Strategy was conceived as a "living document" that will grow and change over time. It relies on cooperation, collaboration and consensus building rather than regulation for its implementation. As a facilitator and funding agency, the Foundation should have many opportunities to contribute to this evolution over the coming years.

GRANTS REVIEW COMMITTEE

The Grants Review Committee was involved in reviewing and recommending a wide variety of projects supporting the preservation of heritage throughout the Region this year.

We are pleased that the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation was able to assist in many exciting new projects. In the area of the performing arts, Theatre & Co. produced an historical play, The Story Chain, that documented the bringing of hydro to the Waterloo Region demonstrating outstanding creativity and innovation. The preservation of one of the Region's architectural gems was assured by the proactive efforts of the Township of Wilmot in its restoration of Castle Kilbride. The Grand River has been a partner in the development of the Region's communities since the time of early settlement. To compliment its designation as a Canadian Heritage River, the Riverbank Advisory Committee of Cambridge has erected signs featuring historically significant sites along the Heritage River Trail.

In addition, the Foundation supported the publication of the Chicopee Ski Club's anniversary book; the restoration of stained glass windows in Wesley United Church; the Schneider Haus quilt raffle; microfilming the New Hamburg Independent newspaper for the Waterloo Historical Society; the compilation of an annotated bibliography of the life and work of Homer Watson for the Homer Watson House; the publication of the Waterloo Historical Society's Annual; the history plaque for the Waterloo County Board of Education's "History Fair"; the publishing of church histories for St. Andrews Presbyterian and Trinity Anglican; and the production of oral history tapes at Kitchener Public Library.

The quality and quantity of grant applications received by the Foundation this year demonstrates a strong commitment to heritage preservation within the Region of Waterloo. In an area that is rapidly becoming more metropolitan in nature, it is a pleasure to promote and support projects that document the strengths and achievements of the past.

My thanks to Grants Committee members Susan Bellingham and Peter Hicknell for their expertise, insight and commitment.
